INTERNATIONAL ROTARY HEAD IS GUEST SPEAKER

Rotarians were urged to translate their ideals into action today by Rotary International president Arthur Lagueux, Quebec City, speaking at a luncheon held in his honor at the Brunswick Hotel, at noon today.

Mr. Lagueux arrived in Moncton this morning with his wife, who was guest of the Rotary Anns at the Shediak Inn.

The international president emphasized the timeliness of the Rotary Club. It responds to today's needs, he added, and changes to meet the times. It has no rigid program, he said.

Service is the byword which expresses the program of the Rotary Club, said the president. The club is vital, and an answer to the need for understanding expressed in the world today, he added.

He mentioned the simplicity of Rotarian ideals, summed up in the slogan, "he profits most who serves best." He urged them to apply the slogan on a world-wide scale.

There were 7,000 Rotary Clubs throughout the world, he said.

with 342,000 members. The club was founded by Paul Harris.

He urged members of the Moncton club to survey the needs of their own community, to see what can be done here. He also urged them not to overlook the international aspect of the Rotary Club. The international situation is every Rotarian's problem, he added, and Rotarians should take the lead in bringing full enlightenment to the public of the problems to be faced in today's world.

He mentioned the disappointment of the democratic world when the fine hopes of peace were not realized. He urged full support of the United Nations and their principles in order to restore full peace.

Mr. Lagueux was born at Tring Junction, P. Q. He has been a member of the Rotary Club of Quebec since 1934, and is a past president of that club. He has served Rotary International as director, district governor and as committee chairman and member. He is an officer of the Order of the British Empire.

Mr. Lagueux was introduced by J. H. Norton. Shediak Rotarians and some from Newcastle as well as other guests from outside clubs were in attendance. Fred Murphy of the Shediak club thanked the Moncton Rotarians for the invitation extended.

Chairman of the luncheon was R. H. Miller, president of the Moncton club.

Mrs. G. O. Spencer was in the chair for the luncheon given in honor of Christine Lagueux, wife of the international president. A toast to Rotary International was extended by Mrs. Spencer, with Mrs. Lagueux responding. A gift was presented to her also as a token of her visit to Moncton.
