PHILIP LOVEJOY, Secretary of Rotary International, will present his annual report to the Convention this afternoon.

Phil has been a Rotarian since 1924 when he joined the Rotary Club of Mt. Clemens, Michigan, U.S.A. In 1927, he became a member of the Rotary Club of Hamtramck, Michigan, and served as its President for two years. He has been a member of the Rotary Club of Chicago since 1931, and he is an honorary member of the Rotary Clubs of Portland, Maine, his birthplace, and of Mt. Clemens and Hamtramck.

Phil held administrative educational positions in the State of Michigan for a number of years until 1930, when he joined the staff of Rotary International as First Assistant Secretary. He has been Secretary since 1942.

Busses will leave from the Hotel Statler, Bagley Avenue entrance, at 1:00 p.m., and will return by 5:30 p.m.

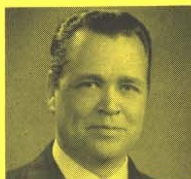
Daily shopping tours have been arranged for the ladies. Those desiring to join these tours may do so at the Ladies Committee Booth.

REPORT ON THE COUNCIL OF LEGISLATION

The Council on Legislation of the 1950 Convention
Herewith Submits the Following Report

The Council on Legislation which met on Sunday, Monday and Tuesday, recommends to the Convention that it take the following action on the various proposed enactments and resolutions before the Convention.

50-12

To amend Rule 6 of the attendance contest rules.
Proposed by the Board of Directors of Rotary International.

The Council on Legislation recommends to the Convention that Proposed Resolution 50-12 be ADOPTED.

50-7

To revise the provisions relating to amendments to the Standard Club Constitution.

Proposed by the Board of Directors of Rotary International.

The Council on Legislation recommends to the Convention that Proposed Enactment 50-7 be ADOPTED.

50-1

To provide greater continuity on the Board of Directors of RI and to increase the number of Directors from fourteen to eighteen.

Proposed by the Board of Directors of Rotary International.

The Council on Legislation recommends to the Convention that Proposed Enactment 50-1 be CONSIDERED AS WITHDRAWN.

50-3

To provide that the Council on Legislation shall be held in each odd numbered year.

Proposed by the Board of Directors of Rotary International.

The Council on Legislation recommends to the Convention that Proposed Enactment 50-3 be CONSIDERED AS WITHDRAWN and referred to the board of directors of R. I. for further study.

50-2

To provide greater continuity on committees of Rotary International.

Proposed by the Board of Directors of Rotary International.

The Council on Legislation recommends to the Convention that Proposed Enactment 50-2 be ADOPTED AS AMENDED, namely:

By striking out lines 11 and 12 of the proposed text and inserting in lieu thereof the following:
Section 5: By striking out the words "and commissions" in the first sentence and by striking out the words "or commission" in the last sentence.

By striking out lines 70 to 77 inclusive of the proposed text.

50-8

To amend provisions relating to senior active membership.

Proposed by the Rotary Club of Barnes, England.

The Council on Legislation recommends to the Convention that Proposed Enactment 50-8 be ADOPTED.

50-10

To delete the word "male" from Article III of the Standard Club Constitution.

Proposed by the Rotary Club of Ahmedabad, India.

The Council on Legislation recommends to the Convention that Proposed Enactment 50-10 be REJECTED.

50-5

To provide that Past Presidents and any voluntary Past Secretary of RI shall be designated as members of the Council on Legislation.

Proposed by the Board of Directors of Rotary International.

The Council on Legislation recommends to the Convention that Proposed Enactment 50-5 be ADOPTED.

50-6

To provide that all income of the magazine shall be expended only for the purposes of the magazine.

Proposed by the Board of Directors of Rotary International.

The Council on Legislation recommends to the Convention that Proposed Enactment 50-6 be CONSIDERED AS WITHDRAWN.

50-19

To indicate the approval of the Convention of RI to amendments to the Constitution of Rotary International in Great Britain and Ireland.

Proposed by the Annual Conference of Rotary International in Great Britain and Ireland.

The Council on Legislation recommends to the Convention that Proposed Resolution 50-19 be ADOPTED AS AMENDED, namely:

By striking out lines 5 to 14 inclusive of the proposed text.

50-13

To amend Resolution 29-12 by changing Article I, Section 9c, "Rules for the Clubs" so as to except senior active and past service members, sixty-five (65) years or more of age, as well as honorary members from the attendance contest.

Proposed by the Rotary Club of San Antonio, Texas, U.S.A.

The Council on Legislation recommends to the Convention that Proposed Resolution 50-13 be CONSIDERED AS WITHDRAWN.

50-18

In the Sphere of International Service.

Proposed by the District Conference of the 51st District of Rotary International.

The Council on Legislation recommends to the Convention that Proposed Resolution 50-18 be CONSIDERED AS WITHDRAWN.

50-15

To provide for the appointment of a committee to study an adequate planning for the Outline of Classifications.

Proposed by the Rotary Club of Sao Paulo, Brazil.

The Council on Legislation recommends to the Convention that Proposed Resolution 50-15 be CONSIDERED AS WITHDRAWN.

50-4

To provide changes in the chronology of the District Conference and District Assembly.

Proposed by the Board of Directors of Rotary International.

The Council on Legislation recommends to the Convention that Proposed Enactment 50-4 be CONSIDERED AS WITHDRAWN and referred to the board of directors of R. I. for further study.

50-9

To provide a more democratic method for nomination and election to the office of President of Rotary International.

Proposed by the Rotary Club of Laurel, Mississippi, U.S.A.

The Council on Legislation recommends to the Convention that Proposed Enactment 50-9 be CONSIDERED AS WITHDRAWN and referred to the board of directors of R. I. for further study.

50-17

Regarding "Private Enterprise."

Proposed by the Rotary Club of Roanoke, Virginia, U.S.A.

The Council on Legislation recommends to the Convention that Proposed Resolution 50-17 be REFERRED TO THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF R. I. FOR STUDY.

50 - 11

To provide that "He Profits Most Who Serves Best" and "Service Above Self" be designated as official Rotary mottoes.

Proposed by the Rotary Club of Columbus, Ohio, U.S.A.

The Council on Legislation recommends to the Convention that Proposed Resolution 50-11 be ADOPTED AS AMENDED, the amended text to read as follows:

To provide that "Service Above Self" and "He Profits Most Who Serves Best" be designated as Rotary mottoes.

WHEREAS the words, "Service Above Self" and "He Profits Most Who Serves Best," have been consistently and widely used in the nature of mottoes by Rotary International for forty years in effective expression of the Rotary basic ideal of service; and

WHEREAS such usage has served to indelibly fix in the minds of the public and Rotarians these words as a part of Rotary's principles and objects; and

WHEREAS Rotary has always taught in its vocational service object the fundamental truth that service is fundamental to profit, whether that profit be in material rewards or in mental and emotional health and satisfaction; and

WHEREAS these words have never been technically adopted by Rotary International as mottoes

although their usage for forty years makes them mottoes in fact, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED by Rotary International assembled in its forty-first annual convention that "Service Above Self" and "He Profits Most Who Serves Best" be designated as Rotary mottoes which may be used in Rotary literature and elsewhere.

50 - 14

Relating to provide for a universal Rotary Motto.

Proposed by the Rotary Club of Sao Paulo, Brazil.

The Council on Legislation recommends to the Convention that Proposed Resolution 50-14 be ADOPTED.

50 - 16

For creating a supreme court of Rotary International.

Proposed by the Rotary Club of Nancy, France.

The Council on Legislation recommends to the Convention that Proposed Resolution 50-16 be REJECTED.
